### **Course Description**

ELP 043 is an advanced reading course that focuses on skills and strategies for effective academic reading. Students at this level are expected to read extensively, both inside and outside the classroom, in order to improve and refine their reading skills. You will practice a number of reading strategies for reading faster and understanding vocabulary in context. Discussion and small group work will follow reading selections to help you develop critical reading and thinking skills. Specific skills we will work on include:

- Identify main idea
- Distinguish between main ideas and details
- Relate support to main ideas
- Understand organization of a passage
- Distinguish between main ideas and details
- Make inferences
- Support inferences with quotes and facts from the reading
- Recognize bias, opinion, and attitudes
- Guess new vocabulary based on context

#### **Materials**

- *Impressions 2* (required)
- Notebook and Folder
- A learner's dictionary, such as *Longman Dictionary of American English* (highly recommended)

#### Grading

Scoring a minimum of 70% on quizzes and tests, attending class regularly, completing homework assignments, and participating in group and class discussions are all required to pass this class and exit ELP.

#### **Final Vocabulary Test**

Without words, you cannot speak, read, write, or understand English. In the ELP, we now require all students to memorize a list of 250 words before moving to a new level or, for level 4 students,

before graduating from the ELP. Memorizing this list is an essential component of your reading class and, more importantly, being able to recognize and use these words will help ready you for mainstream classes at PUC.

# Why are these words important for me to learn?

- Level 1 students: These words are among the 1000 most common words in English.
- <u>Level 2 students</u>: These words are among the 1000 most common (but more difficult) words in English.
- <u>Level 3 students</u>: These words are from the Academic Word List. University experts maintain that in order to succeed in college, a student must have good working knowledge of these words.
- <u>Level 4 students</u>: These are more challenging words from the Academic Word List. University experts maintain that in order to succeed in college, a student must have good working knowledge of these words.

### 250 words?! There are too many words to learn! How can I do it?

Make a plan. Memorize a certain number of words each week. Work with your friends. Make flashcards and study them in your spare time. Draw pictures of the words. Write sentences with the words. Look up images on Google Docs. Visit your teacher during office hours and practice. Most importantly, study your words every day.

## When and how will I be graded on these words?

- You will have regular vocabulary quizzes on these words throughout the semester. Your teacher will tell you which words you will need to learn for each quiz. The quiz questions will be fill in, multiple choice, matching, and/or short answer type.
- In the last week of class, you will take a final test over all 250 words. The final test will include fill in, multiple choice, and matching questions. <u>If you fail to earn a 70% on this test, you must repeat your reading class again.</u>

# What good things will come from learning all of these words?

You will:

- improve your reading, speaking, listening, and writing.
- be able to talk about more interesting things because of your increased vocabulary.
- be able to understand the environment around you.
- be able to meet more friends inside and outside of the ELP.
- be more successful in your classes outside of the ELP.

#### **Late Homework and Exams**

- No late homework or assignments are accepted
- No late or early exams
- No makeup exams

#### **Communication Policy**

Students in the ELP are required to regularly access their PUC email accounts. The ELP does not communicate through non-PUC emails because of issues of privacy. Additionally, the ELP cannot communicate information about other students (such as brothers, roommates, cousins, or wives) to a

student. Finally, grade information must be picked up in person and will not be given over the phone or through email.

# **English Policy**

Students are expected to use only English in their classes for their own benefit and out of respect for others who are attending Purdue University Calumet to further develop their English language skills.

### **Attendance Policy**

Regular attendance is mandatory. In order to learn English, you need to attend all class sessions, arrive on time, and be prepared and attentive. If you will be absent, it is your responsibility to notify your teachers in advance. Ask other students or email your instructor for any due homework. Late work will not be accepted.

There are no excused absences in ELP; that's why students are allowed to miss <u>three classes</u> without penalty. A fourth absence will result in a consultation with the program director. A sixth absence and/or combination of lates turned into absences will automatically result in failure of the course and possible expulsion from the program.

A student will be marked late when he or she arrives up to 20 minutes after class begins. After 20 minutes, the student may be marked absent. Being late 3 times will equal one absence.

Note: You are allowed 5 absences during the semester. Plan appointments and travel around your class schedule.
